WHO draws up short list for next Director-General, gears up for Next High-level Meeting

The WHO Executive Board meeting met in Geneva between 23 January and 1 February. Although the election of the organization's next DG took the spotlight, NCDs were very high on the agenda. After a full day of closed-door sessions, the World Health Organization's Executive Board announced a short list of the three director-general nominees set to face election in May, during the World Health Assembly (May 22-31). Ethiopia's Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, Pakistan's Sania Nishtar, and Britain's David Nabarro made the cut. The Executive Board also discussed the preparatory process for the 2018 UN High-Level Meeting on NCDs. The Board examined a report providing an update on the preparation of the HLM, which includes an update of Appendix 3 to the WHO Global NCD Action Plan. The latest draft of the Appendix 3 contains new recommended actions, including on taxation and reformulation. Several Member States requested a technical briefing to examine the scientific reformulation. Several Member States requested a technical briefing to examine the scientific evidence underpinning the promotion of certain actions. Formal endorsement of the report has therefore been pushed to the World Health Assembly. The group also discussed a draft implementation plan on ending childhood obesity, which aims to guide implementation of the report of the Commission on Ending Childhood Obesity (ECHO). Overall, the report was welcomed by Board members, although several delegations requested more time to review therecommended actions and opportunities to provide some comments. The report will be open for comments and updated ahead of the next WHA.

WHO chooses three candidates to succeed Director-General Margaret Chan
The WHO Executive Board has chosen three candidates from Ethiopia, Pakistan and he United

They are: former Ethiopian Health Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Tedros Adhanom hebreyesus, Pakistani cardiologist and former Federal Minister responsible for Health, Science and Technology, Information Technology and Higher Education, and founder f a health think tank, Heartfelt, Sania Nishtar, and medical doctor and currently a special advisor to the UN Secretary General for sustainable development and climate change, David Nabarro The final choice is to be made by all of WHO's 194 member states at The World Health Assembly, to be held May 22-31, 2017.

National salt reduction programmes combining industry targets and public education are a

"best buy" for governments
A new study undertaken by researchers in the UK and USA from the Institute for Fisca
Studies and the Cambridge Institute of Public Health, Harvard TH Chan school of Public Health, Stanford University and Tufts Friedman School of Nutrition Science and Policy and published in the British Medical Journal, found that a government "soft regulation" strate published in the British Medical Journal, found that a government sort regulation strategy combining targeted industry agreements and public education to reduce population sodium intake by 10% over 10 years would be extremely cost effective in nearly all of 183 nations evaluated. The study was modelled on the successful UK government's salt reduction initiative with the food industry, which has resulted in an overall reduction in salt intake of 11% from 2005 to 2014

Obesity and overweight are on the rise throughout Latin America and the Caribbean According to a new report, Panorama of Food and Nutrition Security in Latin America and the Caribbean, (only available in Spanish) by the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the UN, and the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), almost half the population of all countries in the region, except for Haiti are affected by the rise in obesity and overweight, which is particularly prevalent among women and children. The report calls for the promotion of healthy and sustainable food systems that link agriculture, food, nutrition and health. Read more.

The Business & Sustainable Development Commission calls on business leaders to adopt

more sustainable development models According to a new report, Better Business, Better World, businesses could create up to 380 million jobs and unlock USD 12 trillion in economic opportunities by 2030 if they adopt more sustainable development models. The report used the 17 Sustainable Development Goals to provide the private sector with a framework to shape new corporate strategies that open valuable opportunities while creating a world that is sustainable and inclusive. The Commission focuses on four sectors that could create at least USD 12 trillion, worth over 10% of todays GDP. They are: energy, health & well-being, cities and food and agriculture. The Business & Sustainable Development Commission was launched at the World Economic Forum in Davos in January 2016.
